




What We've Been Up To!

Oh boy, what haven't our Coastal Stewards been up to!? These last few months our team has come together for multiple great turnouts at our last events of the year. On September 12th at McAllister Park in Port Jefferson, Coastal Steward LI took part in a major effort to contribute to the global cleanup of coastal debris. It was fantastic to see that over 60 people came to volunteer to help make a difference! A huge thanks to all our volunteers for helping us remove 3,740lbs of debris from our local beaches. Our team headed to Centennial Park the following weekend to host an underwater cleanup that saw 17 scuba divers from The Dive Club head to the bottom of Port Jefferson Harbor and collect garbage that has sunk below. On October 23rd and 24th a total of 3,180lbs of debris was removed from Centennial Park and Mt. Sinai Harbor.

Throughout the summer our Shellfish Restoration Program has counted, measured, cleaned and raised 80,000 oysters! 20,000 of them were deposited in Mt. Sinai Harbor and the other 60,000 went to various locations in Port Jefferson Harbor. The graph below shows that all of our oysters had nothing short of a season of successful growth as they grew to over 60mm in length. If you've volunteered with us in the past or read our previous newsletters, we mentioned that the oysters we raise have a black stripe on their shell, which is a genetic marker allowing us to know that they are ours. While determining a habitable spot for our oysters in Mt. Sinai harbor our President, Denis Mellett, discovered groups of oysters with the black stripe around 3 to 4 years old with spat (juvenile shellfish) attached to them! This tells us that the work we are doing is paying off and the oysters that we are growing are successfully reproducing in the wild!

As Thanksgiving is approaching, we at Coastal Steward would like to thank our volunteers and sponsors from the bottom of our hearts for all the help and assistance they have given us this past year!
